



What are the goals of a WATCH D.O.G.S. program?

- To provide positive male role models for the students, demonstrating by their presence that education is important.
- To provide extra sets of eyes and ears to enhance school security and reduce bullying.

Who are WatchDOGS and how does WATCH D.O.G.S. work?

WATCH D.O.G.S., a K-12 program, invites fathers, grandfathers, uncles, or other father figures to volunteer a few hours at their child's/student's school during the school year. Fathers and father figures sign up to volunteer through the Main Office by calling their child's school any time throughout the school year. WatchDOG dads and volunteers perform a variety of tasks during their volunteer day including the school entrance, may read and work on flash cards with students, play at recess, eat lunch with students, patrol the school entrances and hallways, assist with traffic flow and any other assigned activities where they actively engage with not only their own students, but other students as well.

On the day of their participation, WatchDOG dads are given a brief review of their involvement and they wear an official WATCH D.O.G.S. vest identifying them as a WatchDOG and the student wears a vest as well. You will have your photo taken and posted on the Watch D.O.G.S. board!
